What We Learned



from Scarborough Southwest

In Fall 2023 and early in 2024, the Bike Share Toronto team heard from nearly 100 community members in the Scarborough Southwest area. Relationships were built with <u>Access Alliance</u> / <u>Scarborough Cycles</u> to support outreach into the community. Here's a summary of what we heard:

BIKING IN THE AREA

Cycling in Scarborough Southwest is oriented towards key destinations like the ravine system and Scarborough Bluffs, with some community members commuting downtown or to local community hubs. Overall, biking in the neighbourhood was described as challenging due to a lack of cycling infrastructure and the car-oriented streetscape.

TOP CHALLENGES AND BARRIERS WE HEARD...

Cycling doesn't feel safe. Cycling infrastructure in Scarborough Southwest is minimal and participants report feeling unsafe cycling on roadways. As a result, people who have not tried Bike Share Toronto (or cycling in general) indicated they're unlikely to do so until additional infrastructure is implemented.

IDEAS AND POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS WE HEARD...

Fill in the gaps to get people to their destination. Participants in Scarborough Southwest (as well as Thorncliffe Park-Flemingdon Park) indicated a desire to travel along Eglinton Avenue, as well as reaching key destinations like the Scarborough Bluffs. Consider prioritizing new stations along Eglinton Avenue East, and along the waterfront, to bridge the gap between the two communities and connect people to the places they wish to go.

Incentivize the community to get moving. Many ideas for financial incentives were shared including:

- Pricing by kilometres (distance traveled) or by destination
- Punch card system (e.g., ride 9 times, get your 10th ride free)
- Free or reduced cost for new riders


